

Hotel Map


FLOOR PLAN

Second Floor




FLOOR PLAN

Focus Areas for Every PBS Practitioner

Whether you're a mental health professional, a home practitioner, a researcher, a professor, an education professional or an overall PBS champion – we've got the right sessions for you. Take a glance at the session focus areas we're offering below!

Early Childhood

Learn about systems change efforts, research, evidence-based practices, and case study presentations related to young children (birth through age 5) and PBS implementation.

Individual Students and Tier 3

Learn how to use PBS principles and technology to support individual students within a school setting. These sessions focus on one or more specific students, rather than the school system.

Tier 2

Learn about delivering interventions to individuals who require targeted supports – in addition to universal supports – and are at risk for developing more serious challenging behavior.

Classroom

Learn how PBS principles and technology are implemented within classroom settings for students with or without disabilities.

School-Wide Systems and Tier 1

Learn about current work in school-wide PBS. These sessions focus on efforts to "scale-up," implement, and sustain PBS principles and technology across multiple schools in districts and states.

Equity

Learn about applying PBS principles and technology to support a fair, inclusive educational system that leads to higher student achievement, increased quality of instruction, improving low-performing schools and/or better outcomes for students from diverse circumstances.

Integration and Alignment

Learn frameworks for integrating and aligning systems of support (e.g., academic and behavior MTSS supports, positive behavior supports and mental health systems, juvenile justice) to enhance student success and interagency collaboration and cooperation.

Home and Community

Learn how to implement PBS principles and technology across the lifespan in a variety of settings, such as home, community centers, adult employment, residential settings, eldercare facilities, and more.

Families and Parent Supports

Learn how to work in partnership with parents and other family members when implementing PBS in school, home, and community settings. Presentations may focus on how professionals can understand, support, and include the family perspective when serving families, or, be aimed at helping parents and family members understand and implement PBS with their family members and in their community.

Intellectual and Developmental Disability (IDD)

Learn more about applying PBS principles and technology to support children and/or adults with IDD in settings outside of school (e.g., home, community). Intellectual disability is characterized by limitations in intellectual functioning and difficulties in a variety of everyday social and practical skills. Developmental disability is attributed to a cognitive or physical impairment that results in limitations in areas such as self-care, language, and mobility. The term IDD covers a broad range of disorders and syndromes.

Mental Health

Learn more about physiological or neurological issues, health, quality of life, and well-being. In addition, presentations describe how PBS principles and technology are implemented within mental health settings.

































Led by Kelly Baird, BCBA, LBA, IBA

Kelly Baird is a distinguished Board Certified Behavior Analyst and passionate advocate for individuals with IDD and mental illness.

As the founder of Black Women in Behavior Analysis Appreciation Day (BWIBAAD) and Vice President of Operations at ABAVerzus, Kelly has created innovative platforms that celebrate, support, and unite professionals in the field of Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA).

A visionary leader, Kelly co-founded and serves as President of the Missouri Black Applied Behavior Analysis Community (MOBBAC), where she introduced The ABA Pathfinders (TAP).

Through TAP, she champions the expansion of inclusive ABA programs, particularly in Historically Black Colleges and Universities, promoting accessibility and diversity in behavior analysis education and training. Her work is grounded in a commitment to fostering representation and creating empowering spaces for clinicians, especially those from underrepresented backgrounds.

At ABAVerzus, Kelly leads a series of groundbreaking events that bring energy, camaraderie, and celebration to ABA conferences. Her efforts are transforming traditional conferences into dynamic, engaging experiences, fostering a sense of community and pride in the field.

Kelly's dedication to supporting clinicians and advocating for their well-being is central to her professional philosophy. She firmly believes that clinicians who feel empowered and supported are key to delivering better outcomes for their clients and communities. Her expertise spans various areas of behavioral science, including psychopharmacology, organizational behavior management, functional analytic psychotherapy, trauma-informed care, and autism support.

The Integrated MTSS Fidelity Rubric (IMFR) is a free tool that underwent a rigorous validation process through data collection with 100 schools over the past three years. The IMFR helps evaluators measure the degree to which elementary schools implement components of integrated MTSS. The goal of the workshop is to train individuals who can serve as external evaluators (e.g., district/state leaders, technical assistance providers, professional development providers, researchers) of schools who want to evaluate fidelity of their integrated MTSS practices. 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

This project involves implementing multiple types of family education using a multi-tiered model, with some proactive strategies available for all families with children in the school and more intensive education offered to families of students with more significant challenging behaviors.

Moving from Data to Action: Interactive Discussion Addressing Disproportionality

The data is undeniable. Students with disabilities are more than twice as likely to be suspended than their nondisabled peers. Black students are nearly 2.5 times more likely to be suspended. We know we can do better. However, little is known regarding the extent to which student voice is implemented with these interventions. The first goal of our presentation is to recommend self-regulation intervention configurations that work best across student characteristics (e.g., gender, race, disability status) and different contexts (e.g., regular, alternative, correctional schools). Our second goal is to provide recommendations for the most effective ways to include students in intervention design decisions (e.g., identifying behaviors to address, writing goals). We will accomplish this goal by reviewing how student voice is included in intervention design decisions and evaluate the extent to which student voice inclusion moderated intervention outcomes. Third, we will provide resources for implementing self-regulation interventions and incorporating student voice in their classrooms.

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





















An Examination of Effective Instruction, Student Behavior, and Anxiety in Classroom Instruction

We want our participants to all get an A+ for managing anxiety. Through this presentation, we'll discuss a series of studies exploring how teacher and student anxiety, effective teaching practices, and student behavior are interconnected in a classroom setting. Students with challenging behaviors often experience anxiety, which can worsen when they struggle in school. Although effective teaching can improve student outcomes, both teacher and student anxiety can negatively impact the classroom environment and teacher-student relationships.

The studies, conducted in virtual classrooms, examine how teacher and student anxiety affect each other during instruction. The main research questions are: (1) How does the use of effective teaching practices influence teacher and student anxiety? (2) How does teacher anxiety impact teaching and student behavior? (3) Are effective teaching strategies different for students of different ages?

During this session, we'll discuss how teachers can manage anxiety and stay focused on effective teaching, even in challenging situations.

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

This session focuses on Tootling, a classroom strategy where students report their peers' positive behaviors to encourage good conduct. In Tootling, students fill out "tootle cards" with examples of prosocial behaviors, and reinforcement is provided when these cards are randomly selected to be shared with the class. It also includes a group-contingency approach, where the entire class benefits from positive behavior, reinforcing individual students' actions.

Research consistently reveals that educators face significantly higher levels of psychological stress and burnout compared to other professions. These pressures have resulted in an increasing number of educators leaving the profession, contributing to a nationwide teacher shortage crisis. That's why recognizing the critical importance of teacher well-being is so essential.

Through this session, we'll present findings from a survey on stress and coping strategies among students in a university-based teacher preparation program. Our study had three main goals, which we'll dive into during the presentation: 1) identify stressors during student teaching, 2) explore effective coping strategies taught in the program, and 3) gather suggestions for program improvements. We'll share our findings and what it means for our work during this presentation.


